How do you vote?

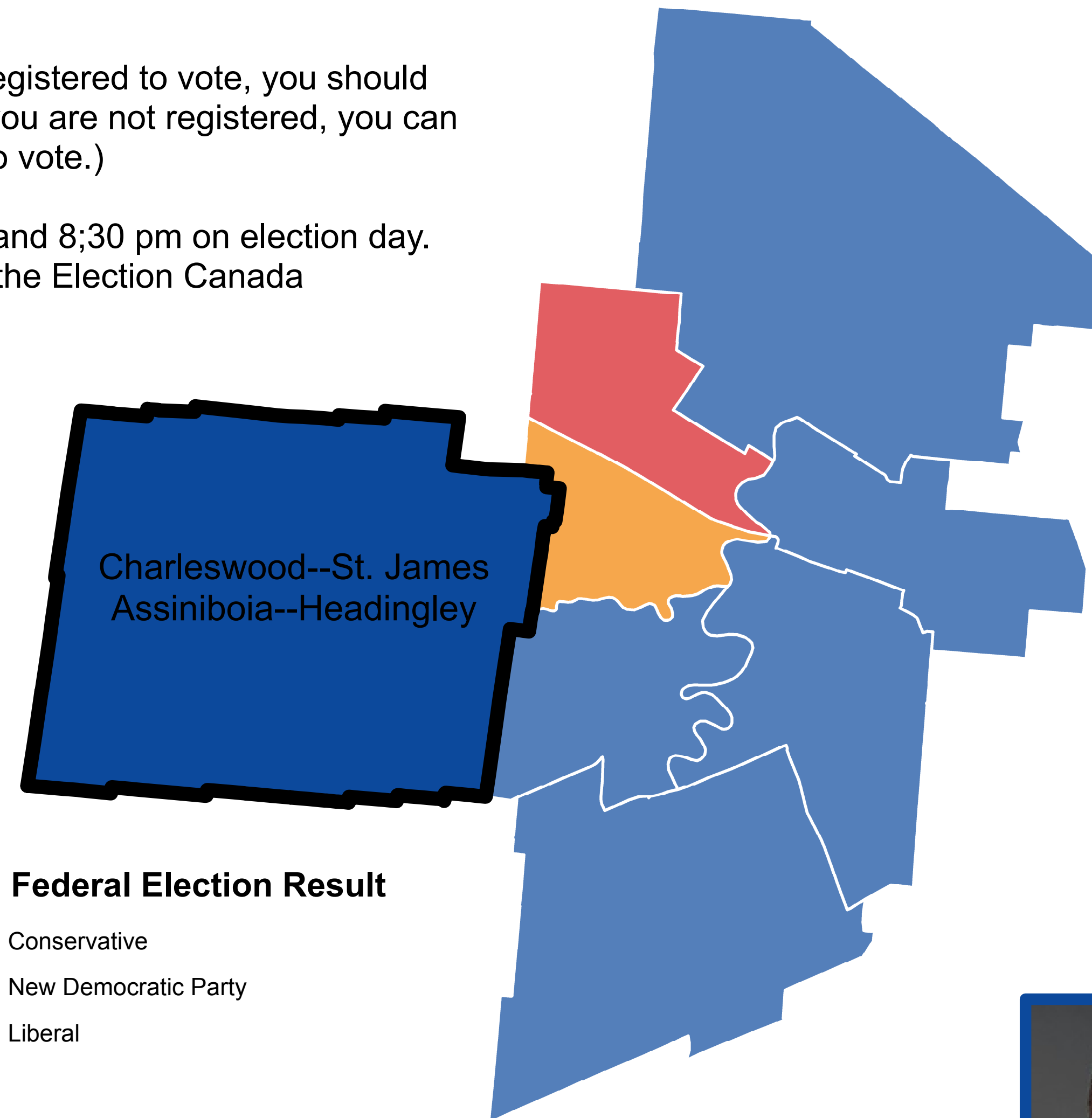
You need to be a Canadian citizen, who is at least 18 years of age on election day.

You must be registered to vote. (If you are registered to vote, you should have received your voter card in the mail. If you are not registered, you can register at your polling station when you go to vote.)

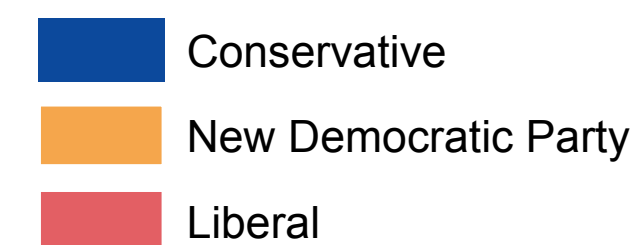
Go to your polling station between 8:30 am and 8:30 pm on election day. (You can find your polling station by visiting the Election Canada webpage.)

Bring your driver's license or Provincial/Territorial ID card to prove your identity. Alternatively bring two pieces of identification, one of which showing your current address, or take an oath and have someone attest to your current address.

2011 Federal Election Result



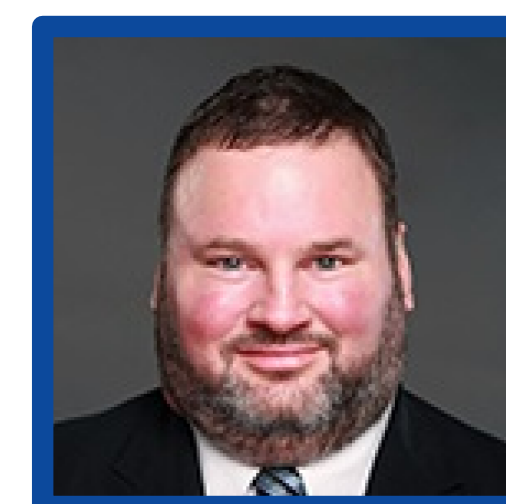
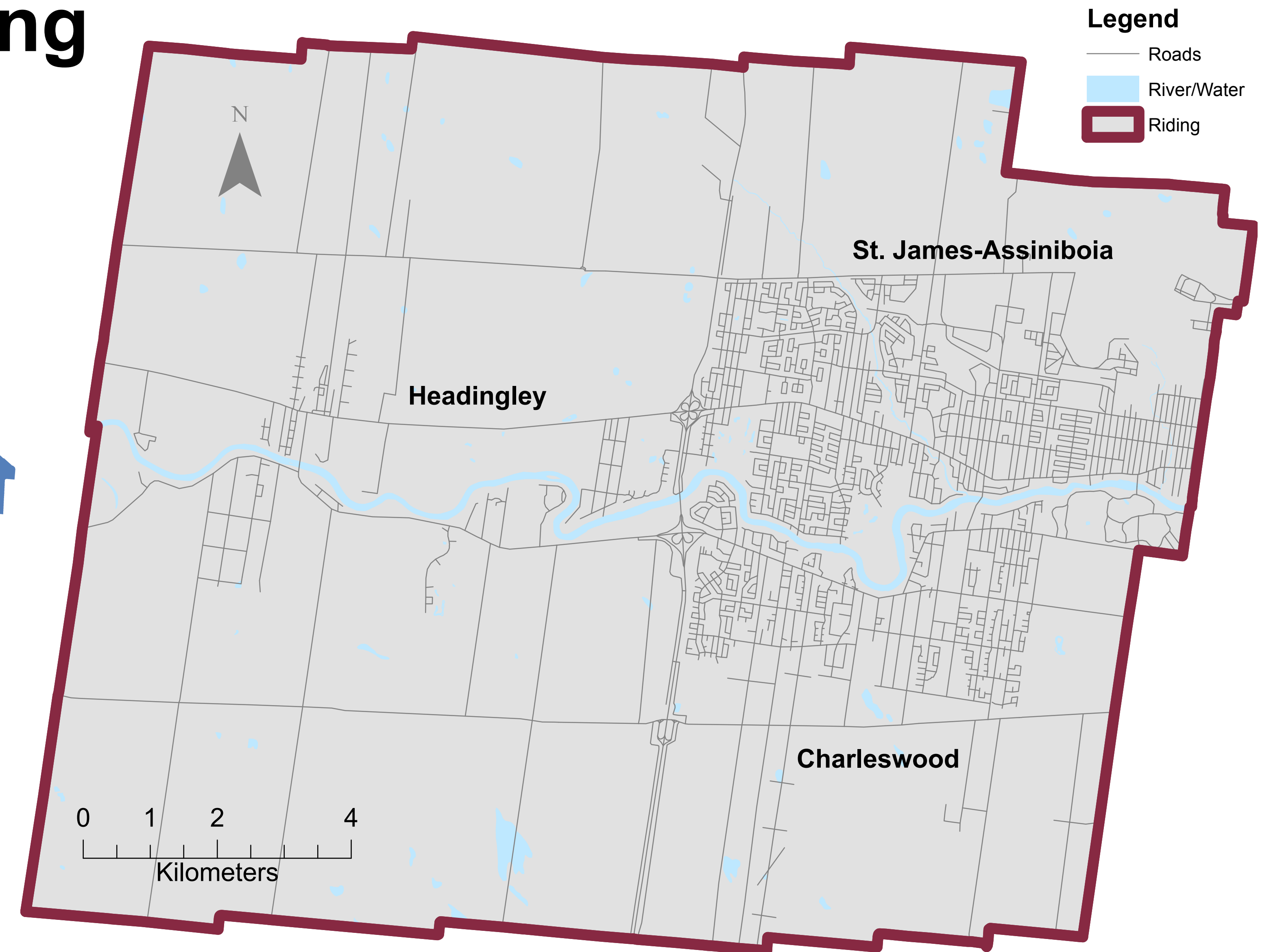
Get to know your riding

The riding consists of the Rural Municipality of Headingley, and the western portion of the City of Winnipeg. The riding has existed with the same general boundaries since 1997. In 1997 and 2000 the riding elected John Harvard, of the Liberal Party, to the House of Commons. In 2004, John Harvard was defeated by the Conservative candidate, Stephen Fletcher, who went on to be re-elected in 2006, 2008, and again in 2011. Each time Fletcher has been elected he has seen an increase in votes and proportion of votes in his favour.

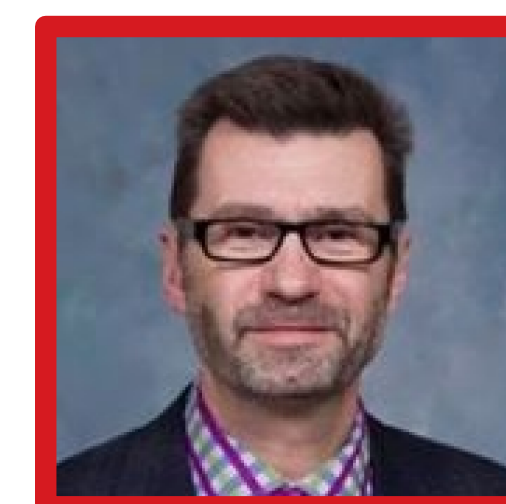
